Anthropology is the study of human diversity around the world. Anthropologists look at cross-cultural differences in social institutions, cultural beliefs and communication styles. They often seek to promote understanding between groups by "translating" each culture to the other, for instance by spelling out common, taken-for-granted assumptions. The four subfields in anthropology are sociocultural anthropology, the study of present-day cultures; linguistic anthropology, the comparative study of language; archaeology, the study of past cultures and physical anthropology, which includes research in evolution and forensic studies.
